A Window to Ireland

Burren College of Art: Artist Residency January 2025 Kimberly Ager

A Window to Ireland is a series of paintings I created to immerse the viewer in the various aspects of the Irish countryside. The landscapes of Ireland, with their rugged cliffs, rolling green fields, and magnificent ruins, serve as both inspiration and subject matter. My goal was to capture not just the visual essence but the emotional atmosphere of these landscapes—the feeling of clouds looming overhead, the solitude of a crumbling castle, the vibrancy of rolling green hills broken up by stone fences.

I created this series during my time as an artist in residence at the Burren College of Art in Ireland. The experience of living and creating in a foreign country for a month was transformative, deepening my appreciation for the landscape's history and the stories it holds. My paintings function as a visual diary, recording my encounters with the land, my evolving techniques, and the emotions that accompanied this journey of artistic exploration. Each piece serves as a window, inviting the viewer to step into a moment of Irish history and natural beauty.

Despite being exhausted, I decided to start off with a sketch of Newtown Castle, the landmark the school is built around.

Without a car, we were fairly limited in our radius of exploration during the first portion of our trip. One spot I found particularly inspiring was the Ballyvaughan Pier which we first visited on January 6th 2025. The stones, concrete and ropes were all tinged shades of green which is where I drew inspiration for this painting. I really enjoyed experimenting with the colours and attempting to create a more realistic texture for the rope. It was quite challenging despite being a fairly small painting.

Since the fields and roads are lined with these walls, they create a patchwork of land and pathways with some of them being ancient and crumbling, while others remain sturdy and tall. I was drawn to their texture and many of my paintings, including this one, feature them.




Newtown Castle & The Burren College of Art



The building closest to the viewer is Newtown House, the accommodation for our stay which we shared with several other artists. The building in the midground is the campus cafe, which connects to the faculty offices and the lecture theatre. In the back, stands Newtown Castle.




